BOARD UNANIMOUSLY VOTES TO INCREASE MEMBERSHIP '26 DUES

Operating Costs Are Up: Membership Support More Important Than Ever. A letter from our Board of Directors, and Center Executive Director

Dear Valued Member,

At the July 16th, 2025 meeting the Board of Directors unanimously voted to increase the annual membership due to \$50 effective

January 1st, 2026.

Since the post-COVID era the Center has experienced increased costs on all fronts to include utilities, food, supplies, payroll, and insurance. (Continued on page 9)


At 11:30 a.m., the event's MC, Herb Day, welcomed guests and a brief

These donations are needed more than ever, as food prices have climbed over the past few years. The center tries to keep our food program affordable, while maintaining quality. Helping us "build" our financial Future. Donation Block Wall Explanation:

In honor of our 55th anniversary, our goal was to raise \$5,500 to put toward a CD and our general operations. At our 55 Celebration event, we built a wall, block by block of donors, who contributed toward our goal of \$5,500. Donation Block amounts were in intervals of \$55 and were as follows: 11" x 17" - \$55, 22" x 17" - \$110 34" x 22" - \$220. The wall was a visual aid to show all who donated and blocks could be designed the way donors wanted. If a name is on the list more than once, they donated toward that many blocks.

We were just \$435 shy of our goal. We have conducted a peanut butter pie raffle that raised \$132, which brought us to \$303 short. We will have another peanut butter pie raffle to lessen the amount, as we had an anonymous donor offer to pay the difference. Our operation depends on donations and fundraising, as we do not receive any funds from tax dollars on a local, state or federal level. The Board and staff work hard to conservatively manage the financial resources of the Center that come mostly from generous benefactors in our community and the fundraising efforts of staff and volunteers.

The Board seeks to retain our excellent staff, provide a wide array of special events and activities, and maintain a safe and comfortable facility. The membership dues increase will assist in this effort. We recognize increased an membership dues may not be a welcomed change, but we believe it is necessary and still a great value for what the Center offers. For perspective, \$50 annually equates to \$4.16 a month. An increase from the current amount has not occurred in over 15 years.

The following is a letter From the Executive Director:

Dear Senior Center Members.

In regards to the membership increase you just read about from the Board:

I did not anticipate how quickly inflation would accelerate after Covid. Like many other organizations in our community, we're adjusting in order to keep our programs and services strong.

We are extremely fortunate to have generous donors, such as the Bodenhamer Trust, and we work hard year-round to raise funds. I've been at the center for the past fourteen years, serving as Executive Director and working hard to support it through fundraising. From Elvis

Presley nights and Hee Haw shows to peanut butter pies, caramel chocolate apples, and so much more, we've gotten creative to keep the center going.

Since I was hired, we've significantly grown our fundraising efforts—with the help and involvement of our members, staff and Board—going from just a few thousand dollars a year to over \$54,000 annually. For many years, those efforts have helped close the gap for our financial needs. However, with the recent and ongoing rise in costs, I've reached a point where fundraising alone is no longer enough to keep up.

Our commitment to fundraising can not decline with the increase in membership dues. We will continue to work just as hard, because it will take all of us—members, donors, and staff—working together to sustain the center and everything it offers our seniors.

As you may know, we do not receive government funding or local tax dollars. Our operations are supported by individuals and businesses who believe in our mission to (Continued on page 15)

Rising costs—particularly for building maintenance, insurance. and utilities—have made it clear that dues need to play a larger role in our budget. Our typical electric bill is now over \$1,000 per month, and after recent supplier rate hikes and a stretch of extreme heat, our most recent electric bill reached \$2.037.42 for the month of July. In February, our gas bill was nearly \$1,200 in the extreme cold.

This year, the center's total expenses are budgeted at \$248,088. With our current number of paying members—316 (remember, Lifetime Members aged 90 and over are free)—dues at the current rate of \$20 bring in \$6,320. At the new rate, we would bring in \$15,800—IF everyone renews. While this still represents only a small portion of the overall budget, the increase is necessary to help sustain the center and continue the programs and services our members rely on.

Here is another development; as

stated earlier, the senior center is not government funded. However, we have worked hand-in-hand with the Vantage program for over twenty-five years, which is a government-funded job training initiative. As a designated job training site, we supervise Vantage participants in roles such as janitorial and kitchen help. These gain valuable participants work experience and build their resumes while the Vantage program provides their wages—at no cost to the senior center. As of July 1st. the government has "paused" this program. If the Vantage program is discontinued, or we have interested participants in the future, the senior center will need to hire staff to fill these essential positions in order to maintain daily operations.

In addition to rising day-to-day expenses, we also need to keep in mind that our building is aging. Just recently we had to spend \$5,000 on a plumbing repair involving an outdated lift system that is now obsolete—but far too expensive to fully replace. While we've done our best to stay on top of regular maintenance, we know there will

come a time when more significant repairs or upgrades will be required. We must be forward-thinking, so we're prepared when those larger needs arise.

Many of you have probably already done the math—\$50 a year breaks down to about \$4.16 a month, or \$1 a week for almost a year. Still, we know that going from \$20 to \$50 might hit hard—especially for some couples. That's why we're sharing this news well in advance, to help everyone prepare. One thoughtful member even suggested setting aside \$10 a month between now and January to cover the cost for their membership in 2026. We don't want the cost to keep anyone from being part of the senior center. If the new dues present a hardship, please know we're here to work with you. Our goal is to continue being a place where seniors feel welcome and valued.

As part of this transition, we may reach out to some members we haven't seen in a while to invite them to remain part of the center and to consider renewing under the new (Continued on page 18)

Mashed Potato Casserole: Not your typical casserole By: Ree Drummond

Casserole Ingredients:


- -1/2 cup (1 stick) salted butter, melted, plus more for the baking dish
- -1 (16-oz.) container sour cream
- -1 (1-oz.) envelope onion soup mix
- -4 lb. russet potatoes, peeled and cut into large chunks
- -1 cup heavy cream, warmed
- -1 lb. bacon, cooked and crumbled
- -8 oz. monterey jack cheese, shredded (about 2 c.)
- -1/2 cup lightly crushed crispy fried onions
- -1 1/2 tsp. kosher salt
- -Black pepper, to taste

:Topping

- -1 cup lightly crushed crispy fried onions
- -1 cup lightly crushed kettle cooked potato chips with sea salt
- -1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese (about 1 oz.)
- -Chopped chives or green onions, for serving

Fluffy, light, filling and packed with flavor! A good way to get vitamins B1, A, B6 and extra potassium and magnesium

- 1. For the casserole: Preheat the oven to 375°F. Generously butter a 13-by-9-inch baking dish.
- **2.** In a small bowl, stir together the sour cream and onion soup mix. Refrigerate while you prepare the potatoes so the flavors have time to meld.
- **3.** Place the potatoes into a large pot and cover them with cold water by 1 inch. Bring the water to a boil over high heat and cook until the potatoes are fork tender, 20 to 25 minutes.
- **4.** Drain the potatoes well and return them to the same pot. Place the pot back on the same burner (heat turned off) and mash until there are no visible lumps.
- **5.** Add the prepared onion dip, melted butter, heavy cream, bacon, monterey jack cheese, fried onions, and salt, and stir to combine. Season to taste with pepper. Transfer the mashed potatoes to the prepared baking dish, spreading them evenly.
- **6.** For the topping: In a small bowl, stir together the fried onions, potato chips, and parmesan. Sprinkle the mixture evenly over the top of the mashed potatoes. Bake until bubbling and browned on top, 15 to 20 minutes. Sprinkle with chives just before serving.


